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COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. To locate the leadership role of the minister within a Biblical and ecclesiological context.
2. To help the student explore their leadership gifts, strengths and growth areas and to evaluate each in their present and future ministry settings.
3. To be exposed to a variety of administrative models with emphasis upon viewing the church as a family system.
4. To provide tools for leading in a church setting, including stressful and difficult parish situations.
5. To acquire an understanding of the value of pastoral administration, including committee meetings and relational investment with parishioners.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class provides an overview of biblical, Christ-like leadership in the context of the office of pastor with practical application of church administration in all times of parish life.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Read textbooks completely and keep a journal with notes and ideas related to the reading. The journal isn't intended to be detailed quotes from the material, but points of interaction with the text, including ideas or questions that arise out of the text. **A journal is not required for *Your Personality and the Spiritual Life*.**
2. Attend all classes and contribute to the class discussion by asking questions or offering ideas.
3. Read assigned articles and come to class prepared to discuss them.
4. Submit an 8-10 page paper reflecting on your leadership style. Take into account class discussion, personality type, textbooks and your own study. Discuss your strengths and growth areas. Interacting with the class texts, how might your strengths assist you in ministry? How might your growth areas hinder your ministry? Suggest 2-3 action steps that might help you address these ministerial growth areas. 8-10 pages.
5. Observe 3 church committee meetings of which you are not a member. Submit a 3-5 page analysis of the meetings. Include in the paper observations about the leader's style, the leader's connection with the members and other thoughts that arise. This is not intended to be an analysis of the meeting's content but to learn about leading meetings.
6. Submit a video of you leading a 30–60-minute church meeting. You will watch the video and submit a self-evaluation. The professor will discuss the session with each student.
